



- BRRT through Northern Healthy Food Ag Equipment funding has provided:
 - In 2006, 60 broilers in Oxford House
 - In 2007, a total of 330 broilers (for meat) and 30 laying hens, in 4 communities
 - In 2008, a total of 310 broilers, 50 layers, and 10 turkeys in 5 communities.
 - In 2009, 270 broilers, 30 layers, and 30 turkeys in 4 communities.
 - In 2010, 210 broilers, 45 turkeys, 10 ducks, and 1 goose in three communities.
